Games for the Main Gallery (or anywhere in the museum)

Twenty Questions: One person is “it” and picks a secret artefact. Others in the group must guess what it is by asking yes or no questions about the artefact: Is it brightly coloured? Is it small enough to hold in your hand? Is it used in the kitchen? (The museum is also a fun place to play “I Spy”!)

Storytelling: Use the museum as your inspiration and make up a story featuring the artefacts on display. Take turns in a group with each person adding the next part of the tale.

Be a Curator! The collections curator decides which artefacts should be in the museum. As you explore, pick one or two artefacts from each exhibit that you would choose for your own museum. In your group, discuss why you would make those choices.

Recreation & Community

Memory: Study the display for one minute. Then turn away and see how many things you can remember about the display: what artefacts did you see? What did they look like?

Food Production & Household

Past, Present, Future: Find an artefact that reminds you of something you use today. How has that object changed over the years?

Find as many **similarities** and **differences** as you can. Then, imagine what people might be using instead 100 years from now!

First Nations

Counting Colours: Nuu-chah-nulth people used cedar, cedar bark and grass to make all sorts of things. Look at the patterns on the baskets, masks, and canoe paddles. How many different **colours, shapes** or **animals** can you count? Which ones are the most common?
